Is This a New Age of Unease?

It seems that we have embarked upon a new "age of unease" in the world. I have been struck how many times in reading about world and local events recently the phrase "we are in uncharted waters" has come up. Whether we are talking about COVID-19, the sluggish economy or the potential food shortages creating discontent among people, we seem to be living in world circumstances of our own creation where it has become increasingly difficult for us to know how to choose well and live in the world.

Of course there is always a lot of blame going around: Democrats blame Republicans; conservatives blame liberals. But few have meaningful answers and solutions that we know can and will work.

And then there is advice. Everyone has advice. Most of the time it is impossible to do what we are advised to do even if one assumes the advice is good.

How does one live in the new age of unease? The letters and writings of St. Paul offer a threefold solution to the problem of the new age of unease in which we are living: "*faith, hope, and love.*" St. Paul wrote in I Corinthians 13: "*So faith, hope, and love abide, these three.*" Faith, Hope, and Love are the Christian's threefold-weapons in the face of anxiety and despair. The Christian understands first and foremost that the evil one desires more than anything else than to create in human beings anxiety and despair.

The Christian also understands that the work of God in his or her life is the opposite of anxiety and despair, namely faith, hope, and love!

How does God do this? God works faith, hope, and love in our hearts through is Holy Word and the Holy Sacraments. And where do we encounter God's Word and the Holy Sacraments in our lives? In the worship of the Christian people – in other words, by attending church: when the doors are open or tuning in through Youtube and Facebook while we are encouraged to "shelter-in-place."

Facing a time of increasing unease in our lives and in the world is not easy. It underscores the importance of making time for God in our lives by our participation in worship and partaking of Holy Communion when offered.

In times of my personal moments of despair and anxiety, the worship of the people of God has been where I have found God bestowing faith, hope, and love on me. Where and how does God bestow faith, hope and loving on you?

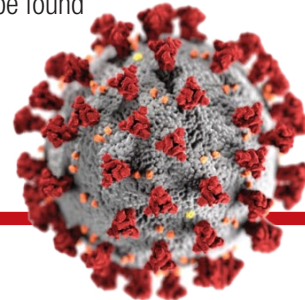

STEWARDSHIP

Do We See Ourselves as OWNERS or MANAGERS of God's Creation?

Welcome to the month of Yam! Wait a minute, you might say. Yam is not one of the twelve months of the year! And you are right, but if you reverse those three letters you have the month of May. You can have some fun reversing words, like your name or the names of others or whatever triggers your imagination.

However, we sometimes get important things reversed and that is not good. For example, we Americans often think of ourselves as "owners" instead of "managers." But that runs contrary to what the Bible clearly teaches in passages like Psalm 24:1 which states that: *"The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it."* The garden belonged to God, but He chose to have Adam work the garden and take care of it. If Adam would have thought that the garden belonged to him, he would have reversed the truth.

If we are not clear on the proper distinction between owner and manager we will have major struggles with Christian stewardship. We will conclude that all the things we surround ourselves with belong to us and, therefore, we can use them in any way we choose. That assumption is a misconception of what the Bible teaches. It is also opposed to the first Article of the Apostles' Creed which says: *"I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth!"* We could also add: "and owner" between "Maker" and "of."

For several decades our church has defined ***Christian Stewardship as the free and joyous activity of the child of God and God's family, the church, in managing (NOT owning) all of life and life's resources for God's purposes.*** That definition clearly distinguishes the important difference between owning and managing.


So, in this month of Yam, oops, May, resolve to grow your understanding and practice of what it means to be a Christian steward. There is an old saying that *"April showers bring May flowers."* During this Easter season with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit we can grow like beautiful flowers that give witness to the beauty and glory of our Father in heaven.


May your stewardship give Glory to God!!

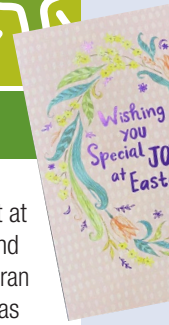

Congratulations if you were able to read those words without singing them or hear them as they were read to you without hearing the tune from "The Sound of Music." Please take some time to think of the significance of the small, white, snow-like flower called Edelweiss.

Edelweiss covers many of the higher areas in mountainous regions of Europe. It does not have a long life, but spreads its seed to produce more and more plants and flowers. The leaves of Edelweiss are soft and almost woolly feeling to the touch. The center of each bloom has yellow-colored flowerets.

So when are we, as Christians, like Edelweiss? It is our intention to walk on the higher ground as we model God's love and His expectations for His children. When we are soft and "wooly" by showing care and compassion, our families, churches, and communities take note. As flowers drop their seeds, so the Holy

Spirit plants seed in us. As these seeds are nurtured and grow into beautiful plants, so we are fed and strengthened on God's Word and the blessed Sacrament of Holy Communion as He has called us to be His through the water and Word of Holy Baptism. We can also feed the faith of those around us, no matter how old or new that faith may be.

The center, yellow-colored flowerets remind us of the opportunity we have to let God's light shine to us and then through us to those with whom we come in contact. Obviously, the fact that this small flower is white has some connections as well. We are white as snow because of the crimson blood of Jesus. Our sins are gone. We are free. While we may still live surrounded by sin as well as add to the sin in our world, we are also forgiven children of the Lord. We are washed clean in His eyes and given eternal life in heaven with all the saints who have gone before us.

So, bloom and grow. Be in the Word so that the seeds of modeling God's love that you drop are pure, strong, and seen by others.

Prayer: Dear Lord, You have created us to share Your love and Your Word with those around us. Help us to be bold and bright so that we attract others to You. Move us to bloom and grow so our lives glorify You. In the holy name of Jesus, we pray. Amen.
